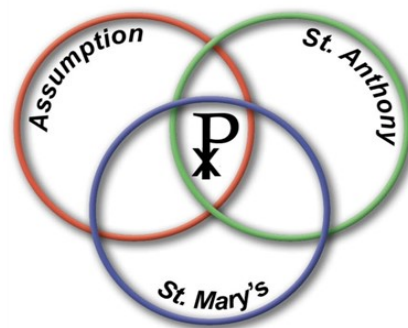

Father's Corner :

Declaration of Independence – July 4, 1776.

The second sentence: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." This has become a well-know statement on human rights and has been called "one of the best-know sentences in the English language." It contains some of the "most potent and consequential words in American history" and has come to represent a moral standard to which the United States should strive.

This sentence goes hand in hand with our faith. The dignity of the human person is rooted in our creation in the image and likeness of God (CCC1700) We are made in Christ, the image of the invisible God that we were created (Col 1:15-16). Therefore, the divine image is present in every human. Respect for all people entails respect for their rights that flow from our dignity as a creature of God. Because we are all created in the image of the one God and endowed with rational immortal souls and are redeemed by the sacrifice of Christ, we have the same nature, the same origin, the same salvation and therefore enjoy an equal dignity. (CCF1934)

We are different due to age, physical abilities, intellectual or moral aptitudes, benefits from social commerce, and distribution of wealth. These differences are in accordance with God's plan so that those endowed with particular talents share the benefits of them with those who need them. (CCC1936-1937). The equal dignity of the human person requires we make the effort to reduce excessive social and economic inequalities. Sinful inequalities interfere with those "unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" mentioned in the Declaration of Independence.

These rights imply among other things the Right to: be recognized as a free and responsible being with the right to exercise freedom especially in moral and religious matters (CCC1739); the right to religious liberty (CCC2106-2108); the right to a good reputation (CCC2479); the right to act in accord with one moral conscience in accordance with the Word of God (CCC1782).

The founders of our nation, know these things "truths to be self-evident" when they wrote and signed the Declaration of Independence. Are you and I living up to this standard?

Senate bill S.231 is a bill before the US Senate – Judiciary committee. It will extend the 14th Amendment that *'nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the law'* This bill declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being at all stages of life, including the moment of fertilization, cloning, or other moment at which an individual comes into being. Nothing in this bill shall be construed to require the prosecution of any woman for the death of her unborn child, a prohibition on in vitro fertilization, or a prohibition on use of birth control or another means of preventing fertilization. This puts the issue in the hands of our elected officials instead of appointed members of the Supreme Court.

The Tomb That Is Its Foundation: They took his body off the cross and carried it from the racetrack. They crossed a nearby street to the closest cemetery and buried him. Christians prayed at that burial site on that day and ever since, for almost two thousand years. Saint Peter's tomb forms the foundation for any structure that has been built to mark his grave on the Vatican Hill, even to this day. What we see in the present Saint Peter's Basilica is the most majestic and magnificent tombstone ever made. One of the most fascinating tours in all of Rome is that of the *Scavi*, the excavations under Saint Peter's Basilica. Going down under this massive church reveals a web of intricate alleys that cut through ancient mausoleums and carry you through centuries of history. You do down to find the tomb of the Fisherman, the First Vicar of Christ, of the Prince of the Apostles. You come out realizing why Rome alone is that city where the pope lives: Rome is the city where the first pope died, and where the first pope is buried. The tomb of Saint Peter remains one of the most privileged places in all the Christian world. Saint Peter's Basilica stands guarding that tomb but also inviting people closer, to kneel there in prayer asking for the forgiveness of a denial, for a strengthening of faith, or for an increase in love. Saint Peter's tomb assures us of all of those graces, because Saint Peter himself received them. ~Father James M. Sullivan O.P.

Do you appreciate the **Sunday evening Mass at Holy Cross during the summer-time?** Please consider taking a turn (or two!) mowing the lawn this season. The Tomb That Is Its Foundation: They took his body off the cross and carried it from the racetrack. They crossed a nearby street to the closest cemetery and buried him. Christians prayed at that burial site on that day and ever since, for almost two thousand years. Saint Peter's tomb forms the foundation for any structure that has been built to mark his grave on the Vatican Hill, even to this day. What we see in the present Saint Peter's Basilica is the most majestic and magnificent tombstone ever made. One of the most fascinating tours in all of Rome is that of the *Scavi*, the excavations under Saint Peter's Basilica. Going down under this massive church reveals a web of intricate alleys that cut through ancient mausoleums and carry you through centuries of history. You do down to find the tomb of the Fisherman, the First Vicar of Christ, of the Prince of the Apostles. You come out realizing why Rome alone is that city where the pope lives: Rome is the city where the first pope died, and where the first pope is buried. The tomb of Saint Peter remains one of the most privileged places in all the Christian world. Saint Peter's Basilica stands guarding that tomb but also inviting people closer, to kneel there in prayer asking for the forgiveness of a denial, for a strengthening of faith, or for an increase in love. Saint Peter's tomb assures us of all of those graces, because Saint Peter himself received them. ~Father James M. Sullivan O.P.
